

St. Peters Mission Statement

St. Peter's Episcopal Church seeks to be a warm, welcoming community of people called to **know, love, worship, and serve Jesus Christ and His people**. We believe that Christian life is a journey. We invite God's people to journey with us.

Profile Summary

The people of St. Peter's are faithful and generous with their time, treasure, and talents. We look forward to continuing our faith journey to know, love, worship, and serve Jesus Christ, and building a vision that will lead us into the future with our next called rector.

Amelia Island attracts active, accomplished, and involved individuals. This population creates a healthy local economy that is driven by a mix of both working professionals and retirees. The core industries include two large resorts – The Ritz Carlton and an Omni Resort, two working mills, Rayonier Advanced Materials and WestRock, and Baptist Medical Center Nassau, a highly rated regional hospital. The island also has A rated public schools and private school options.

St. Peter's parishioners reflect the island demographics while skewing towards pre and post retirement age. In our most recent survey, 80% of those surveyed were 50 years old and above. (Only those 18 and above received the survey.) There are often returning visitors and seasonal members. This demographic is mixed with families that have been a part of the community for generations. The ebb and flow of people can make it challenging to practice and fulfill our desire to be a welcoming community, but it does not impact our eagerness to strive toward our stated mission.

Our once small community parish has grown in footprint, membership, staff, programming, and giving. We recognize that growing from a small-town church into a program size parish requires clear vision and experienced leadership to help us build upon the foundation that has been established.

Our faith community wishes to discover our individual spiritual gifts so that we can expand the depth and breadth of our outreach efforts. We are naturally curious and seek new opportunities to serve Christ and live out our Mission.

The city of Fernandina Beach is located on Amelia Island in Nassau County Florida.

Unincorporated Nassau County includes the rest of Amelia Island outside of the city limits and Yulee ,Florida that is directly across the Shave Bridge from the island. Nassau County also includes the communities of Callahan and Hilliard (approximately 28 and 30 miles from Amelia Island, respectively).

Nassau County, Florida may be accessed along one of four major state and interstate transportation corridors: Interstate 95, US 301/US 1, US 17, and Florida A1A/State Road 200. The first two Interstate 95 exits in Florida – 380 and 373 – are in Nassau County. Two bridges -- one on the west and one on the south -- connect Amelia Island to the mainland. No tolls are charged on either bridge.

Jacksonville International Airport (JAX) is located about 25 miles from Amelia Island and links Northeast Florida with cities across the United States and abroad. Serving both local and visiting pilots, the Fernandina Beach Municipal Airport on Amelia Island accommodates Gulf Stream IV aircraft or smaller.

Nassau County is framed on the north and west by the St. Mary's River and on the east by the Atlantic Ocean. Amelia Island is the northernmost port of call along the Intracoastal Waterway in Florida. The island was named for Princess Amelia, daughter of George II of Great Britain. Public and private marinas are available to serve both transient and resident boaters.

One of Florida's first tourist destinations in the late 1800s, Fernandina's beautiful beaches, charming 50-block historic district, year-round cultural events, fabulous dining and varied shops and galleries continue to enchant visitors.

Named in honor of King Ferdinand VII of Spain, the quaint seaport is steeped in history with an amazingly preserved downtown brimming with Victorian architectural gems.

American Beach is a historic beach community on the island. During the time of segregation and the Jim Crow era, African Americans were not allowed to swim at most beaches in Jacksonville, and several black-only areas were created. American Beach was the largest and most popular, and was a community established by Abraham Lincoln Lewis, Florida's first black millionaire and president of the Afro-American Life Insurance Company. It contains American Beach Historic District, a district which was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2002.

Fernandina Beach is the birthplace of the modern shrimping industry. The city's famed **Isle of Eight Flags Shrimp Festival** began as an annual shrimp boat race. Half a century later, the Shrimp Festival's mix of shrimp, art, entertainment, and pirates now annually entertains more than 100,000 people each May.

Fernandina Beach offers residents a variety of lifestyles, including historical and modern urban residential areas along with a distinctive beach community.

Fernandina Beach was incorporated in 1951 and encompasses more than 10 square miles in the north-central portion of **Amelia Island**. It has an estimated population of 12, 339. Fernandina Beach is Nassau County's largest municipality and the county seat. The city operates a municipal airport, golf club and marina as well as offering a variety of programs through its many parks, community centers, and recreation areas.

Yulee is the name given to some 128 square miles in the unincorporated portion of Nassau County, lying between Interstate 95 on the west and the Intracoastal Waterway on the east.

Named after David Yulee, builder of the trans-state Florida Railroad, Yulee is a mix of historic communities including Blackrock, Nassauville, Hedges and O'Neil as well as newer subdivisions and communities; many started during a rapid period of growth in the 1990s.

The Yulee area has an estimated population of almost 12,000. That number is expected to increase significantly in the coming decade with the development of Wildlight, a 24,000-acre community between I-95 and US 17.

Yulee is an appealing choice for those wanting to be close to the beaches and major roads connecting Nassau County to Jacksonville to the south and Georgia to the north. Residential choices are numerous and range from planned communities, waterfront homes, and small/large private tracts to an emerging rental market.

Area residents and businesses are fortunate to have first-rate physicians and a hospital and emergency department available 24/7 right on Amelia Island. Baptist Medical Center Nassau, a 54-bed acute care hospital, is one of the most up-to-date community hospitals in Florida. It offers a complete range of diagnostic services and a medical staff in 25 different specialties who provide care for most illnesses and injuries encountered today. If you or anyone in your family or business needs medical care, you can feel confident in the high-quality, comprehensive services available at Baptist Nassau and Baptist Health.

All Nassau County public schools received an A rating from the last evaluation given by the Florida Department of Education 2018-2019.





The current growth in the housing market in largely driven by new communities in the off island unincorporated areas of Nassau County, however several new neighborhoods, townhome, condominium, and apartment complexes have been built on Amelia Island in the last five years.



In 2010, household income ranged from a low of \$47,095 to a high of \$62,880 within the five-counties of the Jacksonville metro area. With a median income of \$58,211, Nassau Country ranked third behind Clay and St. John's counties.

History of St. Peter's Episcopal Church

On June 14, 1858, the Reverend Owen P. Thackara met with a small group of Fernandina citizens to form a missionary outpost. In November of that same year, the first Bishop of Florida laid the cornerstone of the first St. Peter's Church in Fernandina on the southeast corner of what is today St. Peter's Cemetery.

In 1881, ground was broken, and the cornerstone was laid for the present-day church. The first service in the beautiful, new Neo-Gothic building was held on March 30, 1884. Early on the morning of February 24, 1892, much of the new church was destroyed by fire. The building was restored, and 15 months later St. Peter's was formally consecrated on Easter Day, 1901. During the 1980s and 1990s, significant building and restoration activities were undertaken including construction of the present-day Christian Education and church office buildings.

It is impossible to accurately represent St Peter's without including the original St. Peter's Church completed in 1859 on the southeast corner of our present cemetery. The cornerstone of the church was laid in 1858 by the Right Reverend Francis H. Rutledge, the first Bishop of Florida (1851-1866). In 1887, six years after the construction of the church now standing at the corner of Atlantic and 8th St, the original St Peter's Church was given to a black congregation and renamed Good Shepherd Church. The church building was later moved across the street.


The Good Shepherd Church structure was showing its age by the early 1960s. Built up off the ground, the building was unstable, and the City of Fernandina Beach condemned it as unsafe. The St Peter's and Good Shepherd congregations decided to build a replacement building for Good Shepherd. However, after lengthy discussions, the Bishop of Florida Hamilton West decided not to consecrate the new Good Shepherd Church building. Instead, the white and black congregations were united in the large church on Atlantic Ave. The building originally designated as The Good Shepherd is now the St. Peter's Youth Building.

A former member of Good Shepherd, Henry Beard Delany, grew up to become the second African American bishop in the Episcopal Church. On June 7, 1889, he was ordained deacon, and on May 2, 1898, he was ordained priest. On November 21, 1918, Delany was consecrated Suffragan Bishop for Colored Work in the Diocese of North Carolina. The African American Episcopalians in the dioceses of South Carolina and East Carolina were also under his jurisdiction. Along with Bishop Edward T. Demby of Arkansas, the first African American Suffragan Episcopal bishop, Bishop Delany was charged with the supervision of African American clergy and parishes within the racially segregated ecclesiastical system of the South. A plaque honoring Bishop Delany can be found inside of St. Peter's parish.

Across Alachua Street, on the north side of the church campus, is the church cemetery, which also has an interesting history. The Union Army occupied the church property in the early 1860s and began burying people here. The first is believed to be young Frederick Albert Grossman, the two-month-old son of Frederick Grossman, a captain in the 7th U.S. Infantry. Near the Iron Gate (right of the center area) is the oldest headstone, which reads "Jeffrey's Boy" 1866. While attending school in Gainesville, he was attacked by a bear from a traveling circus. The church's first rector, the Reverend Owen Thackara rests in the center of the property. South from there is the famed New York architect, Robert Schuyler's headstone. Schuyler designed the present St. Peter's Church as well as Fairbanks House and Hirth House, other island landmarks.

St Peter's today is a large integrated congregation called the "Jewel of Centre Street." Its facilities are utilized for four different weekly services, a monthly Celtic Service, plus numerous parish, and community events.







Surveys were sent via email to 802 unique address and approximately 20 paper copies were mailed out. 205 responses were recorded representing 67% of average Sunday attendance. The demographics closely mirror those of the island.

The percentage of parishioners who pledge has continued to increase over the last few years. When stated as a percentage of family units, approximately 43% of families pledge. The amount pledged represents 72 % of total offerings. Over the past five years, offerings have exceeded expenses and exceeded budget for four of the past five years. Even during the pandemic, income exceeded expenses. In addition to weekly offerings, the people of St. Peter's provide generous support for outreach and mission work and the support of St. Peter's Charitable Foundation. We also are close to completing the implementation of a successful \$1.2M Capital Campaign that expanded our youth center, roofed the parish hall, education, and office buildings, renovated the parish hall kitchen, bathrooms, and restored our historic Harrison Pipe Organ . (A sampling of projects)

We would like to see pledging increase as the church continues to grow especially through online pledging. Although our income has grown, predictable income will allow for more thoughtful growth and budgeting.







The key qualities of a transformational parish are: Growth, Expansion of Facilities, Replication, Church Mentoring, and Increased External Impact

As shared previously in the demographic section of the profile, the people of St. Peter's tend to be flexible because we represent many different points of view. When you isolate questions 3 and 4 it is clear to see that we are most flexible when caring for others.

Flexible Style Index

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The Flexible Style Index registers the degree to which the church is willing to make adjustments in the way it goes about its ministry. The more flexible a church, the more likely it is to adapt to the particular context in which it is serving to meet either the needs of its members or those of the community. The less flexible a church, the more likely it is to believe that a particular style is central to its identity.

The degree of flexibility in a church should be consistent with its strategic priorities. For example, if a church indicates that one of its priorities is to make necessary changes to attract families with children and youth, it should have the degree of flexibility necessary to achieve that goal.



According to the *HolyCow Consulting CAT* data, we fit best into the *Magi Culture Profile*. This is common among Episcopal churches. When plotted onto a chart, we are in the lower adaptable quadrant and close to the line separating Progressive and Conservative. This is certainly reflected in our diversity of worship and educational opportunities.

Liturgical Style

We offer a wide variety of worship services that reflect the creativity and differences of our parishners.

St Peter's uses the 1979 Book of Common Prayer and 1982 Hymnal and *Lift Every Voice and Sing* for all services except the Beach Eucharist and monthly Celtic services.



Outreach

The *HolyCow Consulting CAT* survey revealed and ranked St. Peter's parishioners' passions and priorities for the future. These priorities were also compared and indexed against other parishes. The following statement from the survey shows the numeric priority ranking and the level of passion as compared to other parishes. It is one of two statements that received a Very high passion level.

Priority #4. Passion level, Very high - Expand outreach ministries that provide direct services to those living on the margins of society.

Members of St Peter's actively support international missions in the Caribbean and Honduras. The Men's Mission team has sent 17 teams to rebuild and repair churches and other buildings in our sister diocese in the Caribbean.





The Women's Mission team supports Our Little Roses, a girl's home in San Pedro Sula, Honduras with annual visits and fundraising activities to provide for the children.





The Youth Group attracts teens from the middle and high schools for weekly meetings, community support, as well as Mission trips and international Pilgrimages.













Regionally, parishioners enthusiastically support the Kairos Prison Ministry, Cursillo, and the Brotherhood of St Andrews.

On a local level, Rise Against Hunger was launched first within the St. Peters community and after 3 years, it outgrew the parish hall. Other community organizations joined in as the annual event was move to the Atlantic Recreation Center where in January 2020, 58,000 meals were packed to support this global mission.



Prior to the COVID restrictions, the Men's Breakfast teams provided Sunday breakfasts for both parishioners and the community. Our young children worked together to assemble back packs for the homeless. The Women's Knitting Ministry create blankets, caps, Prayer shawls and other personal items for those struggling with ongoing health issues. In 2020, St. Peters led a non-denominational, multi church collaboration of a community discussion program entitled, "Community Conversation on Race".

The church supports agencies such as Hope House and Barnabas, financially and with volunteers.
